

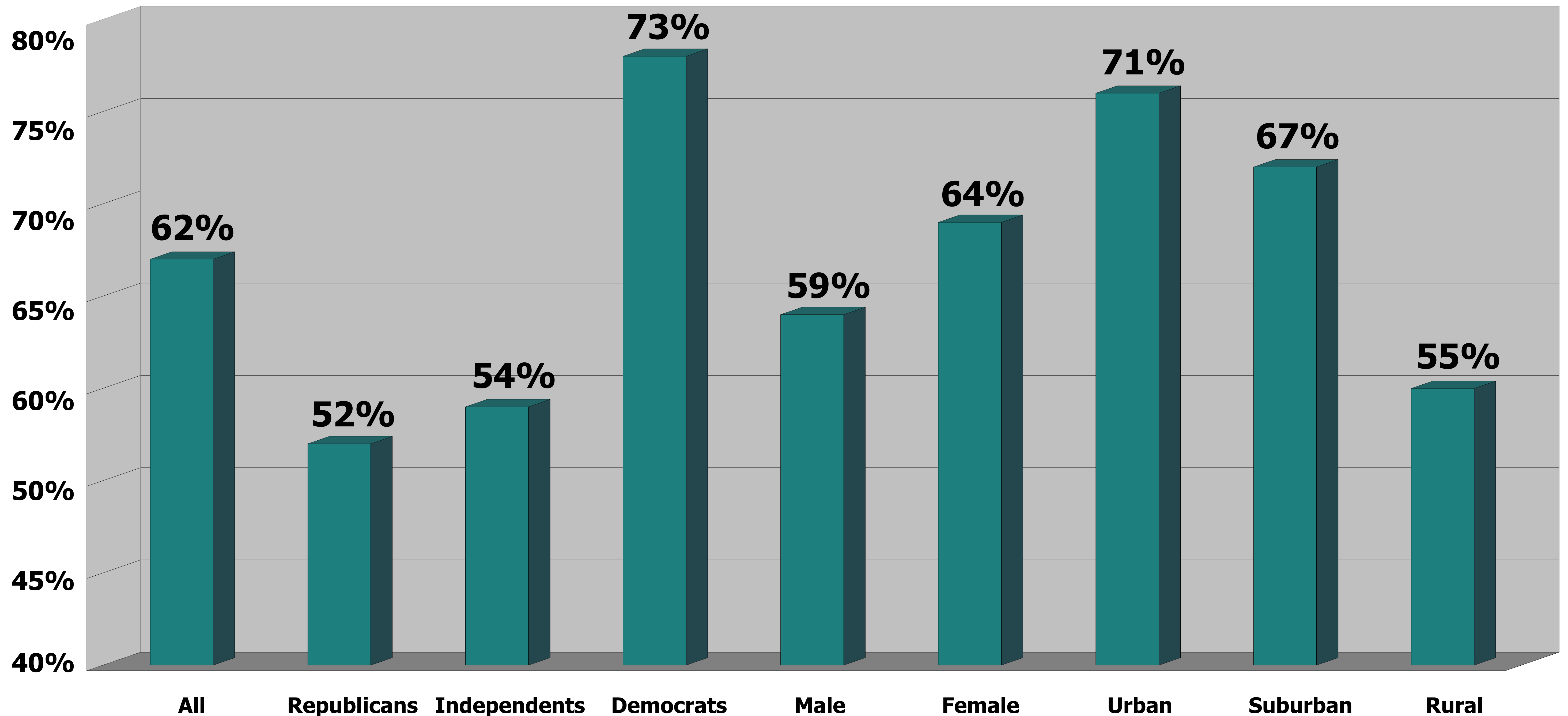


Serious problem areas persist in operation of Kentucky's death penalty

- **Lack of Data on Capital Cases**



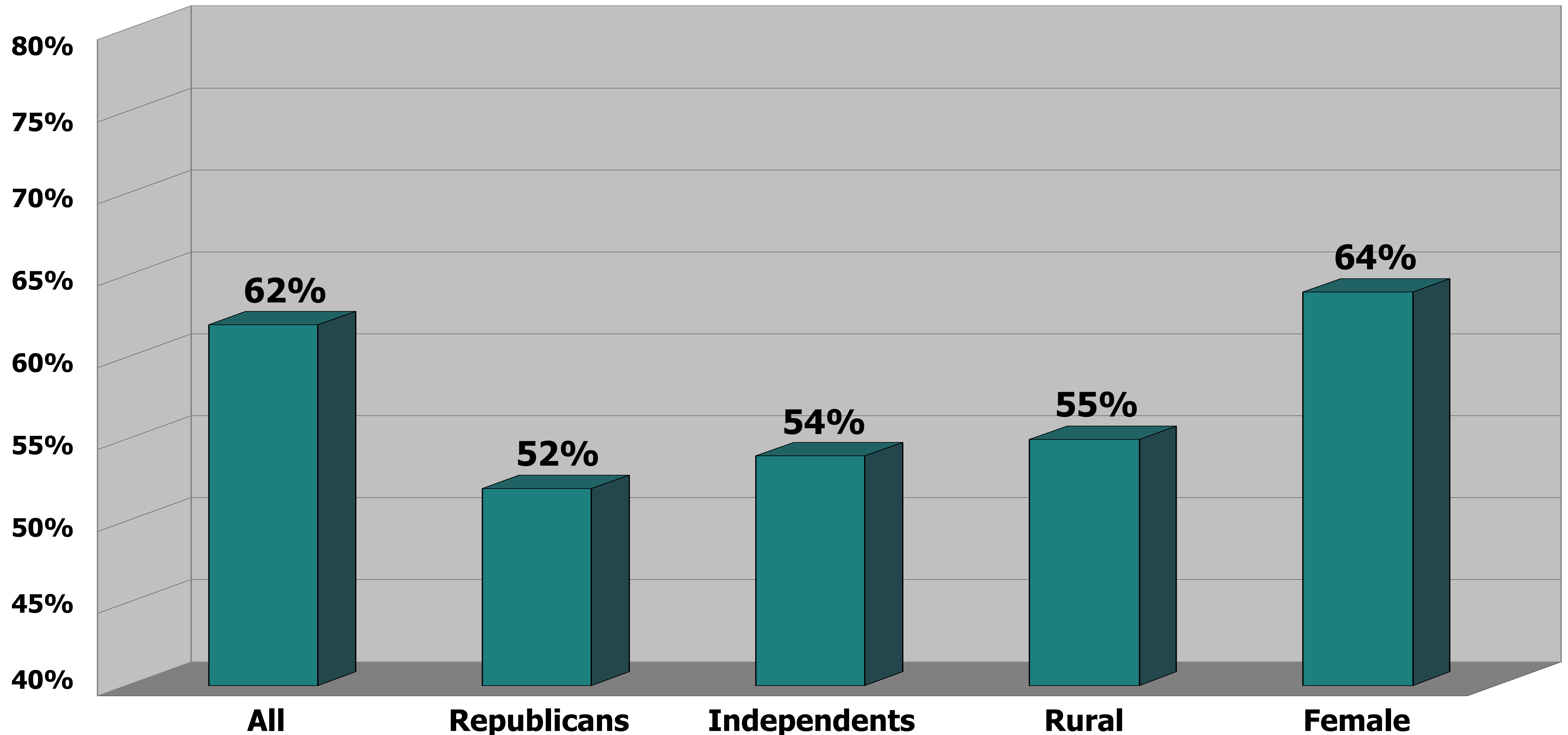
A majority of likely voters in Kentucky—regardless of where they live or their political party—support a temporary halt to executions.

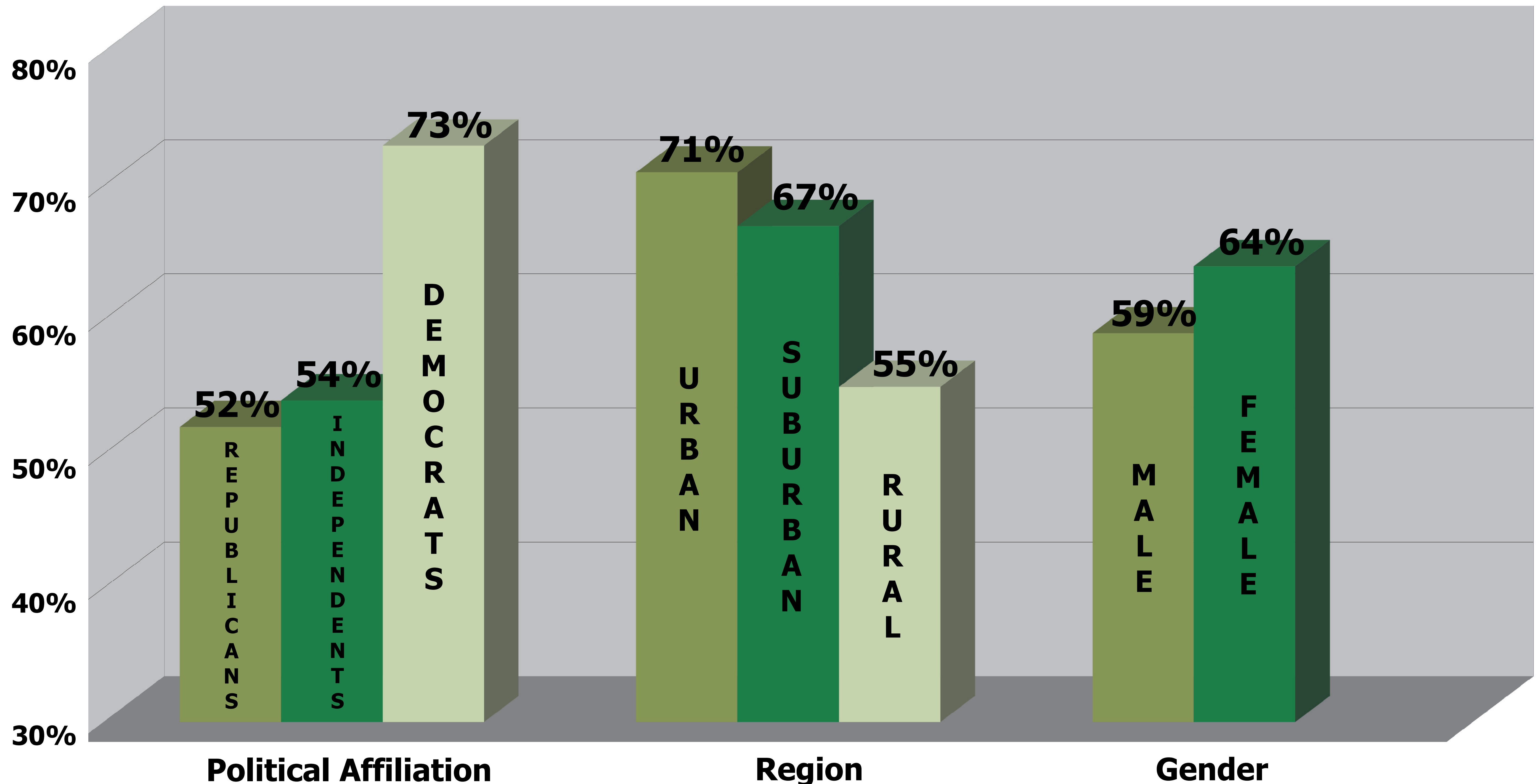
