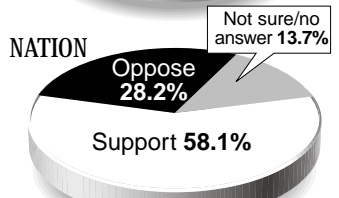
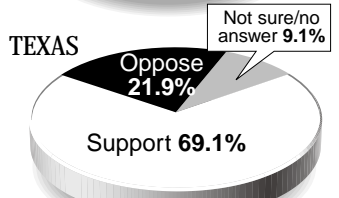
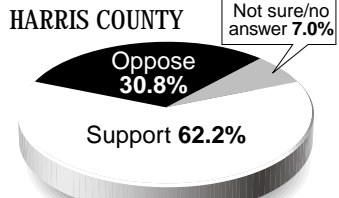


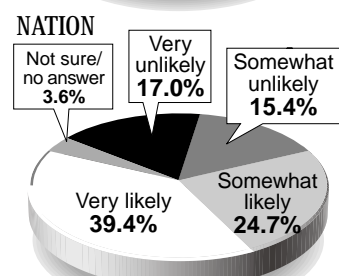
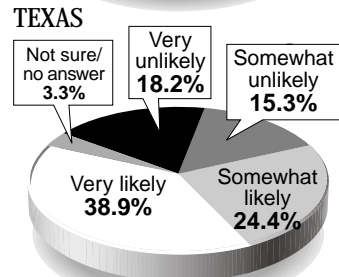
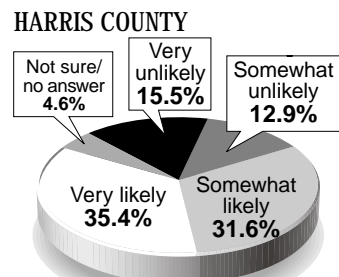
Chronicle Poll

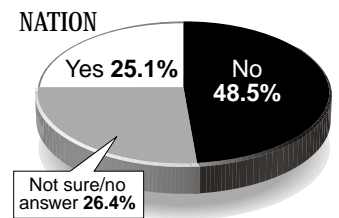
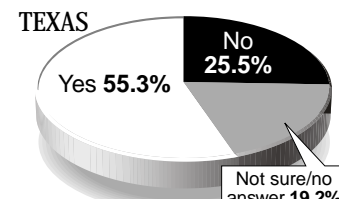
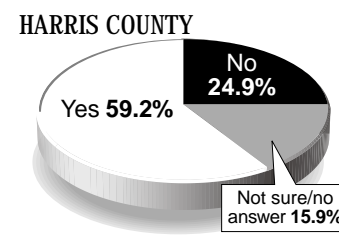
Q Do you support or oppose the death penalty?



Q How likely is it, in your opinion, that an innocent person or people have been executed since the United States resumed applying the death penalty?



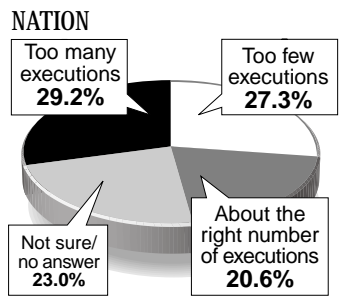
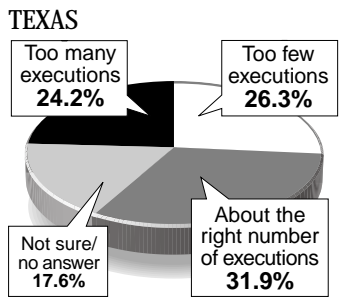
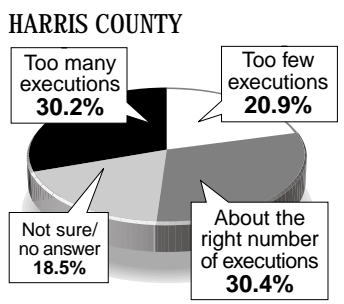
Q Do you believe your state has executed an innocent person?



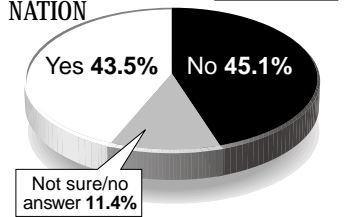
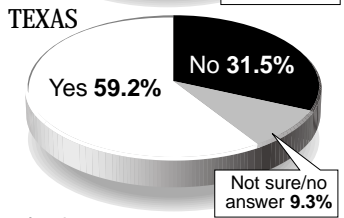
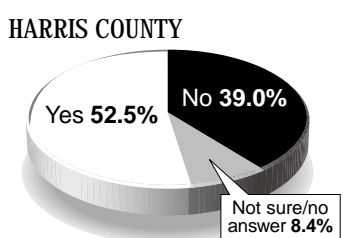

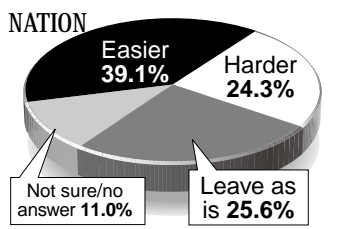
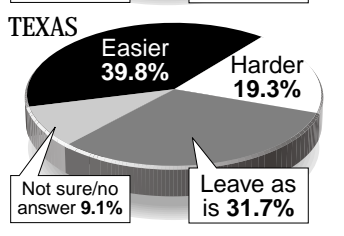
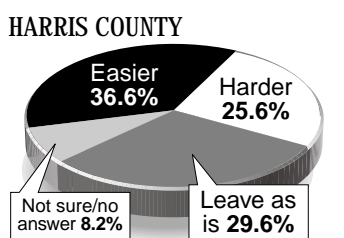
Q In general, do you think the death penalty is fairly applied in the United States?



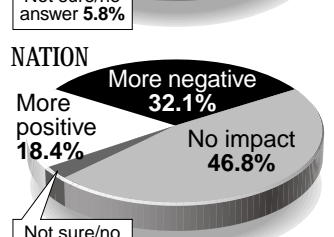
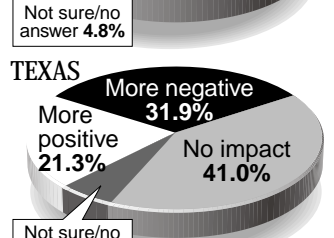
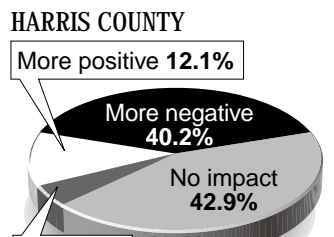
Q Do you believe the death penalty is applied fairly and equitably to persons of different races or ethnic groups?



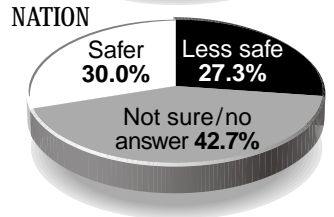
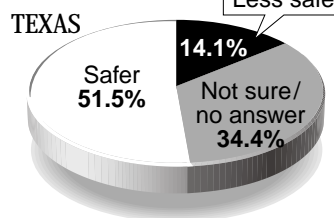
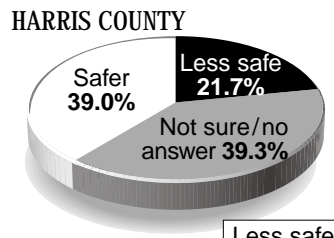
Q Some states have large death row populations of persons awaiting execution. Do you think it should be easier for these states to carry out the death penalty, harder, or should things be left as they are?



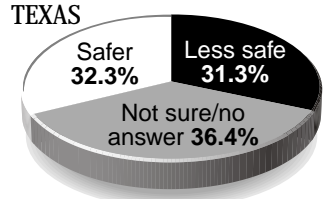
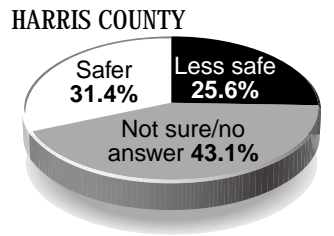

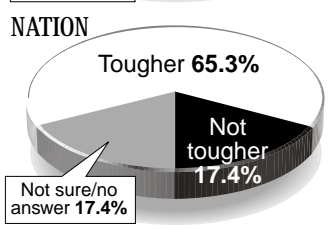
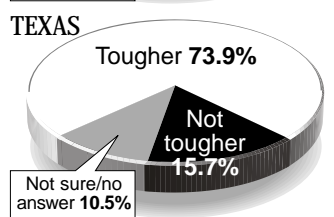
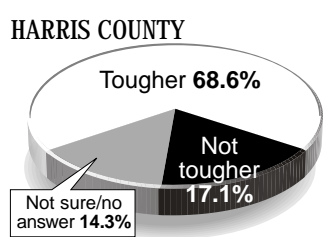
Q Given its higher number of executions, do you think Texas is a safer or more dangerous place to live compared with other states?



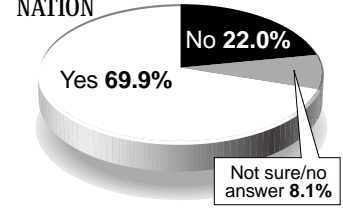
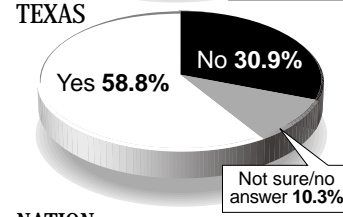
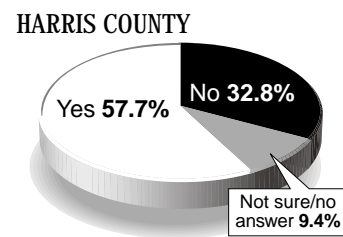

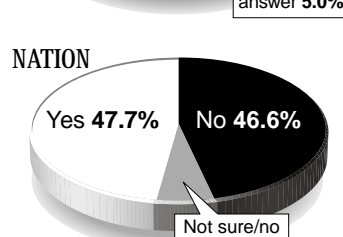
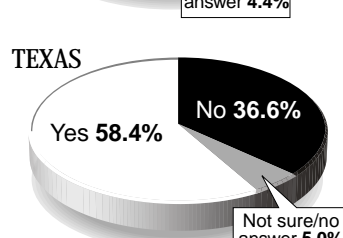
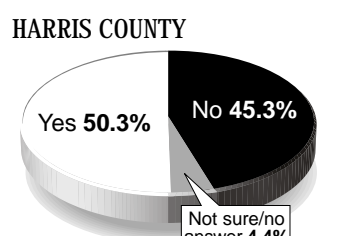
Q Should there be a higher threshold of proof of guilt before a jury may impose a death sentence?
